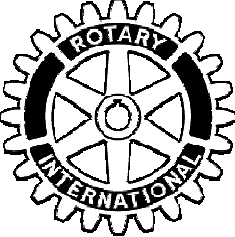

Last Week’s Program – ROTARY FOUNDATION

Ann Kennedy began by talking about her favorite Rotary program, Group Study Exchange, a part of Rotary International. She led a team to India and found out for herself that we’re basically the same across the globe – we want education opportunities for our children and ourselves and clean drinking water.

Ann has participated in many GSE activities over the years, and shared with us a jacket filled with pins representing different parts of the world.

The Rotary Endowment Fund, now Rotary International Foundation, was founded in 1928. IN 1930 it undertook its first project, helping the International Society of Crippled Children, today known as Easter Seals.



When Paul Harris passed away in 1947, the Paul Harris Fund was started from donations in his honor. In 1965-66, GSE and the Matching Grants programs were started, followed by Polio Plus in 1984-85.

Today the Rotary Foundation has over \$1 billion of which \$426,808.67 has been contributed by our Club. She stressed the importance of “Every Rotarian Every Year,” and giving to the Foundation.

Ann passed around the map of giving to illustrate the Foundation’s gifts and giving. Next year Saturday classes will be offered on Rotary Foundation. Please see Ann or Carole for more information.
